Long-Stay Activity Statistics 2011

Prepared by the Information Unit, Department of Health

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Introduction and Summary of Results

This report presents data collected through a survey of long-stay units in 2011. The aim of the survey is to provide statistics on the number of beds available for long-term care, how the beds are used and the types of patients who occupy these beds.

In order to present the data this report has been divided into a number of sections. This introductory section examines how data was collected and analysed and gives a summary of the results.

Section A presents a summary of demographic data on older persons within the Irish population through an analysis of the 2011 Census of Population. It also presents data from Eurostat (the statistical office of the European Union) and the World Health Organisation (WHO) European Health For All database in order to compare the Irish older population with older populations in Europe. This section provides a context within which to examine the data collected from long-stay units.

Section B presents data according to type of unit and Section C presents data according to region. An examination of gender, age, dependency, medico/social status, admissions, discharges and length of stay is undertaken in these sections. Section D looks at individual long-stay units within each area according to the type of unit. Details of number of beds, patients, admissions and discharges are presented.

Methodology

Each long-stay unit was sent the questionnaire reproduced at Appendix 1 of this report. Responses were coded and entered into a relational database and analysed. Following validation, tables and graphs for the final report were produced using software developed in the Department of Health. In 2011, 474 valid questionnaires were returned out of a total of 581 giving a response rate of 81.6%. The table below gives the response rate, that is, the number of questionnaires returned by long-stay units as a percentage of total number of long-stay units surveyed within each area.

Section A

Demographic Data Relating to Older Persons

Section A presents summary data on the population of older persons in Ireland. It also presents updated data published by Eurostat for 2011 and the WHO European Health For All database updated August 2012. For the purposes of this section this population is defined as those persons aged 65 years of age or older.

National Data

The latest Census of Population was carried out by the Central Statistics Office on 10 April 2011. The results of the census indicated that Ireland's population has continued to grow strongly since Census 2006, increasing by 348,404 persons to 4,588,252 persons, an increase of 8.2%. This translates to an annual average increase of 1.6%. The population aged over 65 has increased by 14.4% since 2006. The male population aged over 65 rose by 17.5%, compared with 12.0% for women. The population aged over 85 increased by 21.6% from 2006 to 2011, with the male population in this age group increasing by 24.5% and the female population rising by 20.3%.

Marital Status

Tables A1 to A3 look at marital status and gender of older persons by age group. Over half (54.1%) of older persons in Ireland are married but this percentage declines in the older age groups and the percentage of widowed persons increases. A larger percentage of older men are married (66.3%) compared to older women (43.9%). Conversely, there is a larger percentage of women who are widowed (39.8%) compared to men (12.7%). The discrepancy in marital status between men and women is to a considerable extent explained by the different percentages of men and women in each age group thus reflecting significantly longer female life expectancy (see tables A11 and A12). Overall, 54.5% of the older population is female and 45.4% male, while 31.6% of the population over 85 is male and 68.4% is female.

Older Population by Area

Tables A4 to A6 examine the older population by age and gender within each region broken down by age group. Just under 60% (56.9 %) of the older population is aged 65 to 74 years of age and another 19.1 are in the 75 to 79 year age group. There are significant differences between men and women in their age distribution. Again, this is due to the longer life expectancy of women. Most strikingly, only 7.6% of men compared to 13.7% of women are in the 85 years and older age group. Also, in absolute numbers there are 20.0% more women than men aged 65 and over.

Within the State, 11.7% of the population is aged 65 or older. However, this percentage varies from 10.5% in Dublin / North-East to 13.0% in the Western Region. However, in absolute numbers, the Southern Region has the largest number (146,189) of people aged 65 and over with Dublin/North-East having the lowest at 107,225 persons. This distribution of older people across the five age categories is very similar for each region even when broken down by sex.

European Comparison

Population

Tables A9 to A14 look at the Irish older population in the context of the European Union.

Table A9 shows that the Irish older population is still the smallest in terms of proportion of total population. According to Eurostat, in 2011 the Irish older population made up 11.6% of the total population. This compares to an EU average of 17.5%, a proportion that Ireland is not due to reach until sometime between 2026 and 2031, according to CSO population projections. Germany and Italy have the highest proportion of older people, recording a figure of 20.6 and 20.3% respectively, with Slovakia and Cyprus having the next lowest after Ireland at 12.4% and 12.7% respectively.

Life Expectancy

Tables A11 and A12 present comparisons of life expectancy at age 65 for EU countries obtained from the WHO European Health For All database. At age 65 Irish women are expected to live another 21.0 years which is equal to the EU average. On average women at age 65 can expect to live at least an additional 20 years in seventeen of the EU states. Men in Ireland at age 65 are expected to live another 17.8 years, which is above the EU average of 17.4 years. The life expectancy of men at 65 is generally lower than that of women. The EU countries with the highest life expectancies for women at age 65 are France and Spain followed by Italy and Luxembourg. Spain is also the country with the highest life expectancy for men at age 65, followed by Cyprus, Malta and France. The EU country with the lowest life expectancy for women at age 65 is Romania while the country with the lowest life expectancy for men at age 65 is Latvia.

Old Age Dependency Ratio

Tables A13 to A14 give details of the old age dependency ratio (i.e., those aged over 65 years as a proportion of those aged 15 to 64 years) in Europe. Table A13 compares the old age dependency ratio in Ireland with the other EU Member States and the EU average in 2011. Ireland has an old age dependency ratio of 17.4, which is the second-lowest in the EU after Slovakia. This compares to the highest ratio of 31.2% in Germany and a European average of 25.9%. Please note that some data in this table is provisional and, where data for 2011 was unavailable, data for 2010 is used instead.

Table A14 below shows the trend in the old age dependency ratio in Ireland and the EU average from 2001 to 2011. From this table it is clear that the trend in Ireland is quite different from the trend among the EU Member States. Over this period the old age dependency ratio in Ireland has remained below that of the European average and decreased for a time during this period while the EU average has consistently increased. This is clearly evident when the difference between the two ratios is examined over time.

Population Projections

The CSO produces population projections at regular intervals. These are derived from models based on assumptions about fertility, mortality and migration. The latest set of population projections were published in April 2008 based on 2006 Census data and covered the period 2011 to 2041. These figures show that the total number of people aged 65 years and older is projected to increase by a factor of two and a half between 2011 and 2041. Also, those aged 85 years will be more than four times greater in number.

As the population ages, the old age dependency ratio in Ireland is also likely to rise. According to Eurostat data, in 2016 the old age dependency ratio will increase to 20.0% in Ireland, compared with an EU average of 28.5%. It is then set to increase over time and is likely to more than double by the middle of this century, but will continue to be lower in Ireland than the EU average.

Section B

Survey Results by Category of Long-Stay Unit

This section examines data collected from the survey of long-stay units by category of unit. The following categories are used:

HSE Extended Care Unit	A facility run by the Health Service Executive. These institutions generally provide accommodation for older people who are in need of care for medical reasons.
HSE Welfare Home	A home run by the Health Service Executive. These institutions generally provide accommodation for older people who are in need of long or short-term care for medical or other reasons.
Voluntary Welfare Home	A home run by a charitable non-profit making organisation in which patients are not maintained for the personal profit of the proprietors. This includes all welfare homes run by religious orders as well as homes run by lay charitable organisations. These institutions generally provide accommodation for older people who are in need of long or short-term care for medical or other reasons.
Voluntary Home/Hospital for Older People	A home run by a charitable non-profit making organisation in which patients are not maintained for the personal profit of the proprietors. This includes all nursing homes run by religious orders as well as homes run by lay charitable organisations.
Private Nursing Home	A home which is run as a private business for the care and maintenance of dependent persons. As the term implies, these are nursing homes established by private individuals or by companies in the private sector, which are run on a profit-making basis.

Respondents to the survey select the category on the questionnaire which applies to the long-stay unit of which they are proprietor or which they are managing (see Appendix 1).

Table B1 below gives details of the number of beds of each type, number of patients and the occupancy rate of long-stay units in the above categories. The overall occupancy rate for long-stay units is 90.7%. This varies from 94.9% within the category Voluntary Welfare Homes down to 86.2% in HSE extended care units. Nearly two-thirds (61.9%) of patients were resident in private nursing homes and 24.0% were in HSE extended care units.

Gender and Age

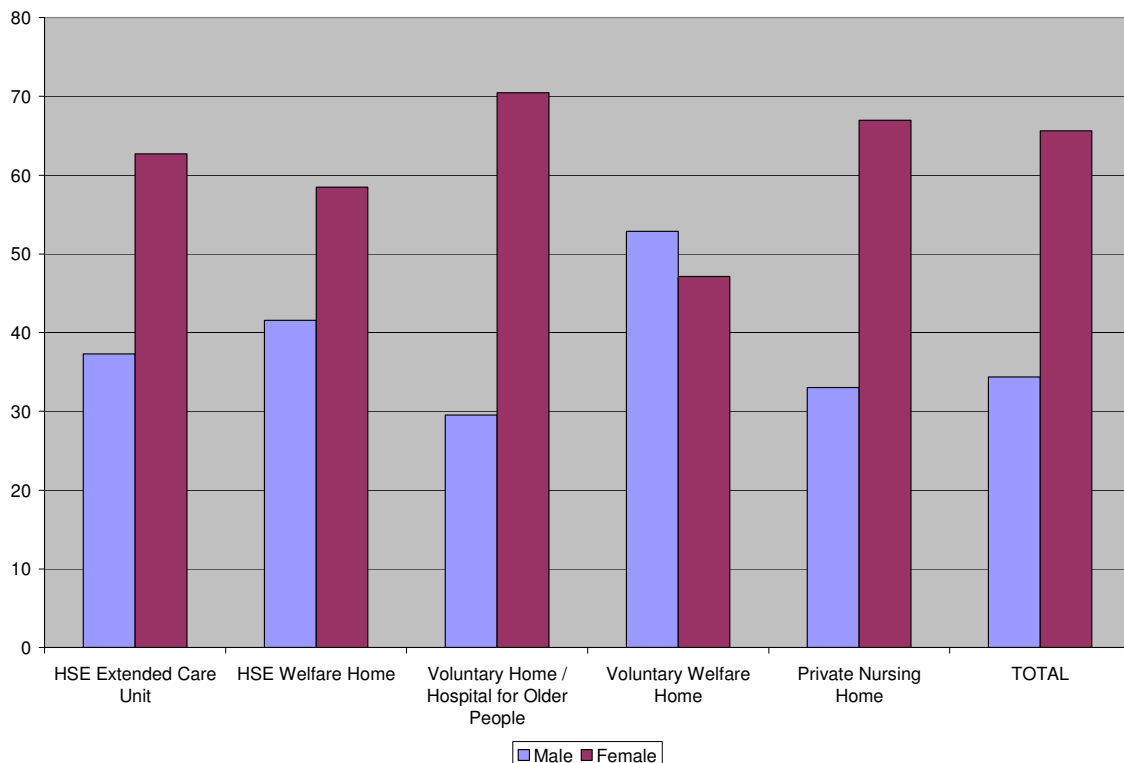
Tables B2 to B5 and figures B1 and B2 look at the gender and age distribution of patients within long-stay units.

Almost two-thirds (65.6%) of patients are female. This percentage breakdown varies by bed-type and by unit type. Almost two thirds of patients in long-stay beds are female (66.1%). The corresponding percentage in limited-stay beds is 59.9. Over 70% of patients in voluntary homes / hospitals for older people are female compared to 47.1% in voluntary welfare homes.

Over two-thirds of patients (69.4%) are aged 80 and over. This varies from 49.8% in voluntary welfare Homes to 71.2% in voluntary homes / hospitals for older people. The proportion of patients aged 95 and over is 6.0%, which ranges from 3.7% in voluntary welfare homes to 6.6% in voluntary homes / hospitals for older people. There is also variation by bed-type. Nearly two-thirds of patients (61.5%) in limited-stay beds are aged 80 and over, compared to just over two-thirds (70.1%) of patients in long-stay beds. The percentage of patients over 95 in long-stay beds is 6.3% and 2.5% in limited stay beds.

Female patients show an older age profile compared to male patients. Over three-quarters (76.3%) of female patients are 80 years or over while just over half (56.3%) of male patients fall into this category. Similarly, 7.6% of female patients are 95 years or over while only 3.0% of males fall into this age category. The age profile of those in limited-stay beds is younger than those in long-stay beds for both sexes.

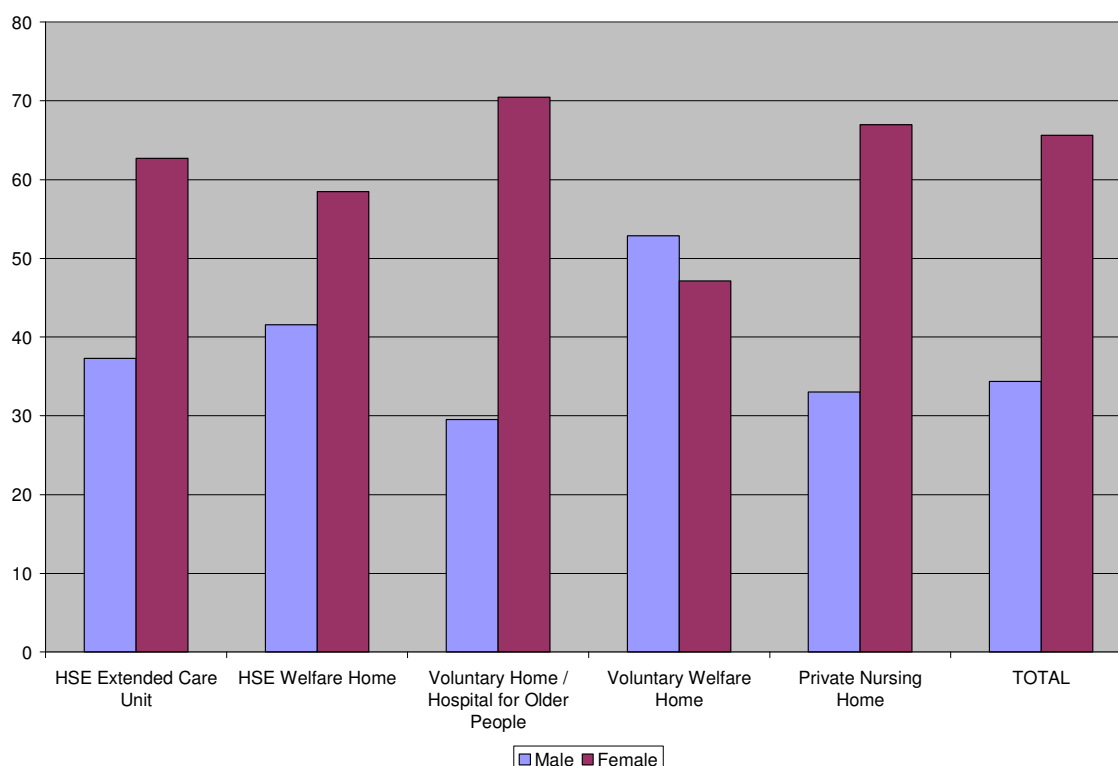

Dependency

Respondents were asked to indicate how their patients were distributed across four dependency levels of low, medium, high and maximum. The definitions for these categories are as follows:

Low Dependency Persons who need some support in the community and the more independent residents in residential accommodation who require little nursing care. They are usually independently mobile but may use a walking stick and have difficulty managing stairs.

Medium Dependency Person whose independence is impaired to the extent that he or she requires residential care because the appropriate support and nursing care required by the person cannot be provided by the community. Mobility is impaired to the extent that the person requires supervision or a walking aid.

High Dependency Independence is impaired to the extent that the person requires residential care but is not bed bound. The person may have a combination of physical and mental disabilities, may be confused at times and be incontinent. He/she may require a walking aid and physical assistance to walk.

Maximum Dependency People whose independence is impaired to the extent that he/she requires nursing care. The person is likely to be bed bound, requires assistance with all aspects of physical care and may be ambulant but confused, disturbed and incontinent.

Table B6 gives details of the distribution of patients according to their dependency category and by bed-type and long-stay unit category. The largest proportion of patients is in the maximum dependency category, who would require a high degree of nursing care and assistance.

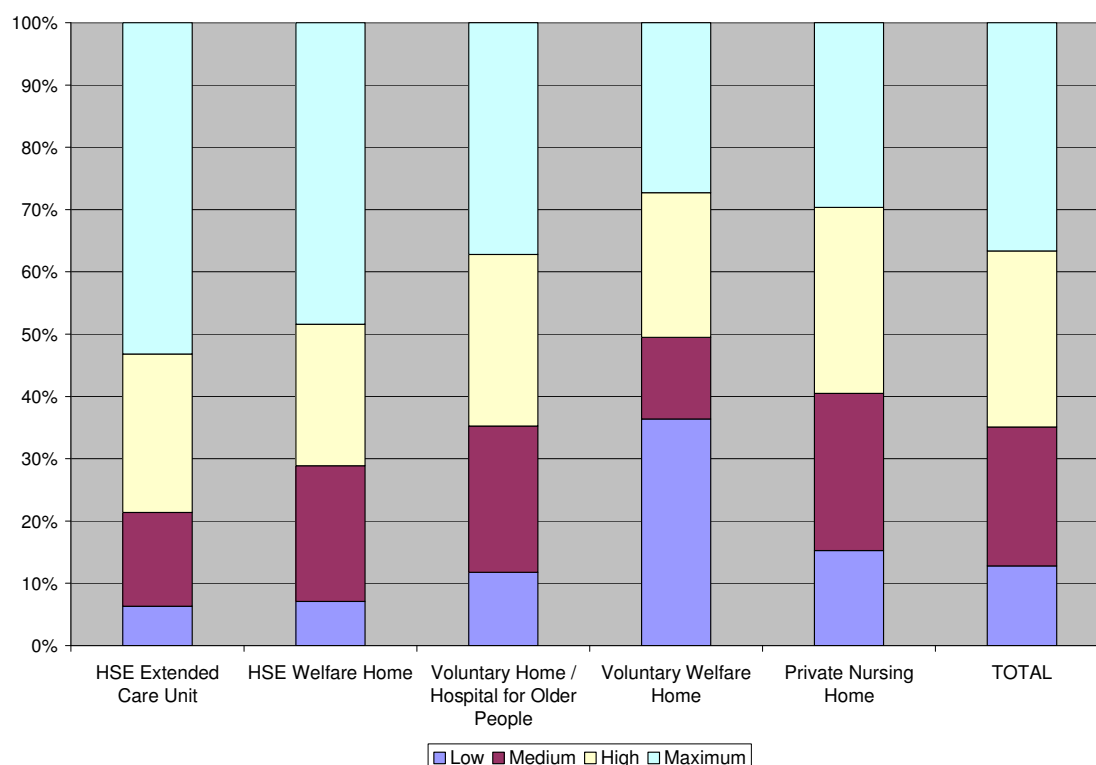
Two thirds (64.9%) of patients are in the high and maximum dependency category. This varies from just over half (50.5%) in voluntary welfare homes to over three-quarters (78.6%) in HSE extended care units. The proportion of patients in these categories in private nursing homes is slightly below average (59.5%).

Almost two-thirds (66.5%) of patients in long-stay beds are in the high or maximum dependency categories compared to less than half (46.0%) of patients in limited-stay beds.

Medico/Social Status

Respondents were asked to categorise their patients according to their Medico/Social Status (i.e. the main reason for residence) at 31st December 2011. Eleven categories were provided:

Respite	Dependent persons admitted for short periods of time in order to assist their carers in their task of caring.
Chronic Mental Illness	'Mental illness' means a state of mind of a person which affects the person's thinking, perceiving, emotion or judgement and which seriously impairs the mental function of the person to the extent that he or she requires care or medical treatment in his or her own interest or in the interest of other persons. For mental illness to be chronic it would have to be sustained continuously without remission over a period of time.
Chronic Physical Illness	There is no formal definition of chronic physical disease but such illness would normally be characterised by having lasted a long period of time, is usually irreversible, and may be progressive.
Convalescence	Persons admitted for short periods of time in order to allow them to recuperate after an illness/injury.
Rehabilitation	Persons admitted for short periods of time in order to allow them to receive rehabilitation after an illness/injury.
Dementia	Severe dementia means a deterioration of the brain of a person which significantly impairs the intellectual function of the person thereby affecting thought, comprehension and memory and which includes severe psychiatric or behavioural symptoms such as physical aggression.
Physical Disability	Physical disability, in relation to a person, means a substantial restriction in the capacity of the person to carry on a profession, business or occupation in the State or to participate in social or cultural life in the State by reason of an enduring physical impairment.
Intellectual Disability	Significant intellectual disability means a state of arrested or incomplete development of mind of a person which includes significant impairment of intelligence and social functioning and abnormally aggressive or seriously irresponsible conduct on the part of the person.
Social Reasons	This category covers admissions for reasons other than medical ones.
Palliative Care	Palliative care beds are allocated to patients at a time when the medical expectation is no longer cure.
Other Reasons	

The category with the largest proportion of patients was chronic physical illness (32.8%) followed by dementia (29.2%). Together these two reasons accounted for over half of cases in all categories of long-stay units except for voluntary welfare homes where roughly a quarter (24.6%) of patients were resident for intellectual disability and only 15.8% had dementia, while 23.6% had a chronic physical illness and 13.8% were resident for social reasons.

Nearly three-quarters (73.4%) of patients in limited-stay beds were there for respite, convalescence or rehabilitation. These categories account for 0.8% of patients in long-stay beds.

Admissions

Respondents were asked about the number of admissions during 2011 and the source of these admissions. The following categories were provided:

- from the community (e.g., the patient's home)
- from an acute hospital
- from another long-stay hospital/home (including private nursing homes)
- from other sources

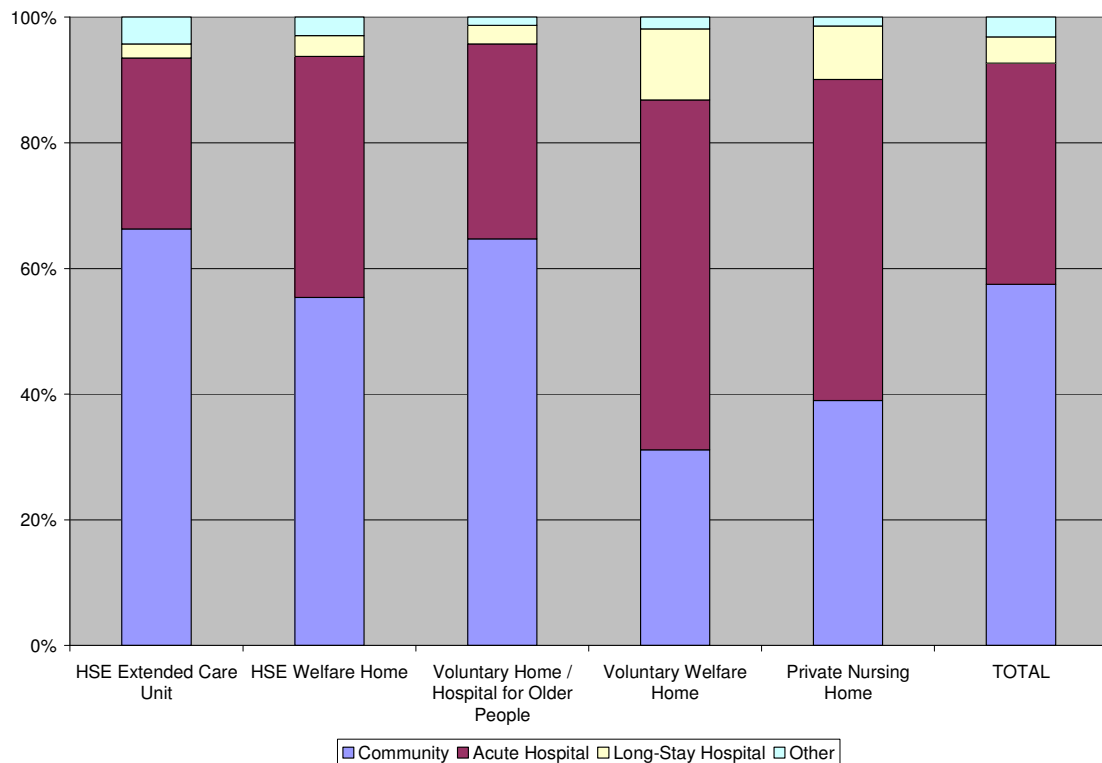
More than half of admissions (57.5%) during 2011 came from the community, ranging from 66.3% in HSE extended care units to 31.1% in voluntary welfare homes. The proportion of admissions from the community was also somewhat below average for private nursing homes, at 39.0%. The largest proportion of admissions to voluntary welfare homes and private nursing homes came from acute hospitals at 55.7% and 51.1%, respectively. Admissions from sources other than the community and acute hospitals amounted to 7.3% of all admissions to long-stay units.

Almost half (50.8%) of admissions to long-stay beds were from acute hospitals, with another 28.7% from the community and 17.1% from other long-stay hospitals/homes. Nearly two thirds (63.2%) of admissions to limited-stay beds were from the community with another 32.1% admitted from acute hospitals.

Discharges

Respondents were asked how many patients were discharged throughout the year and the destination of the patients who were discharged. The categories provided were:

- into the community
- into an acute hospital
- into another long-stay hospital or home
- other destination
- deceased

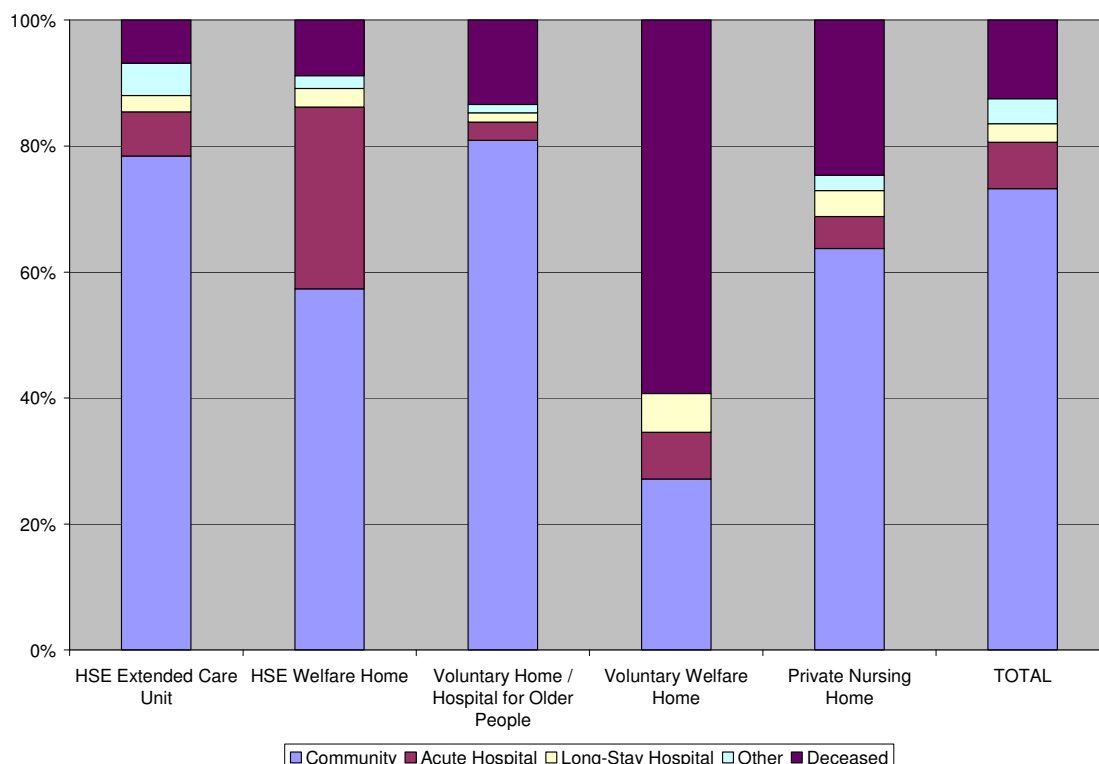
Table B9 and Figure B5 give details of the destination of patients upon discharge. Discharge patterns are very different when comparing bed-type. Nearly two-thirds of patients (63.8%) in long-stay beds were discharged during 2011 on death, ranging from 50.2% in HSE extended care units to 80.8% in voluntary homes / hospitals for older people. The percentage of patients discharged on death from limited-stay beds was 2.5.

The majority (84.8%) of patients in limited-stay beds were discharged into the community. By contrast, only 13.6% of patients in long-stay beds were discharged into the community, while a further 12.9% of patients were discharged to an acute hospital. In the case of HSE extended care units, 22.7% were discharged to an acute hospital and 17.7% to the community, while 6.0% of patients in voluntary homes / hospitals for older people were discharged into an acute hospital and 5.8% were discharged into the community.

Length of Stay

In relation to patients who had been discharged, respondents were asked how long patients had resided in each long-stay unit. Table B10 below gives details of patients' length of stay by long-stay unit category.

More than four-fifths of patients (84.9%) resided for less than three months. This varied from 27.2% among voluntary welfare homes to 92.0% among patients in HSE extended care units.

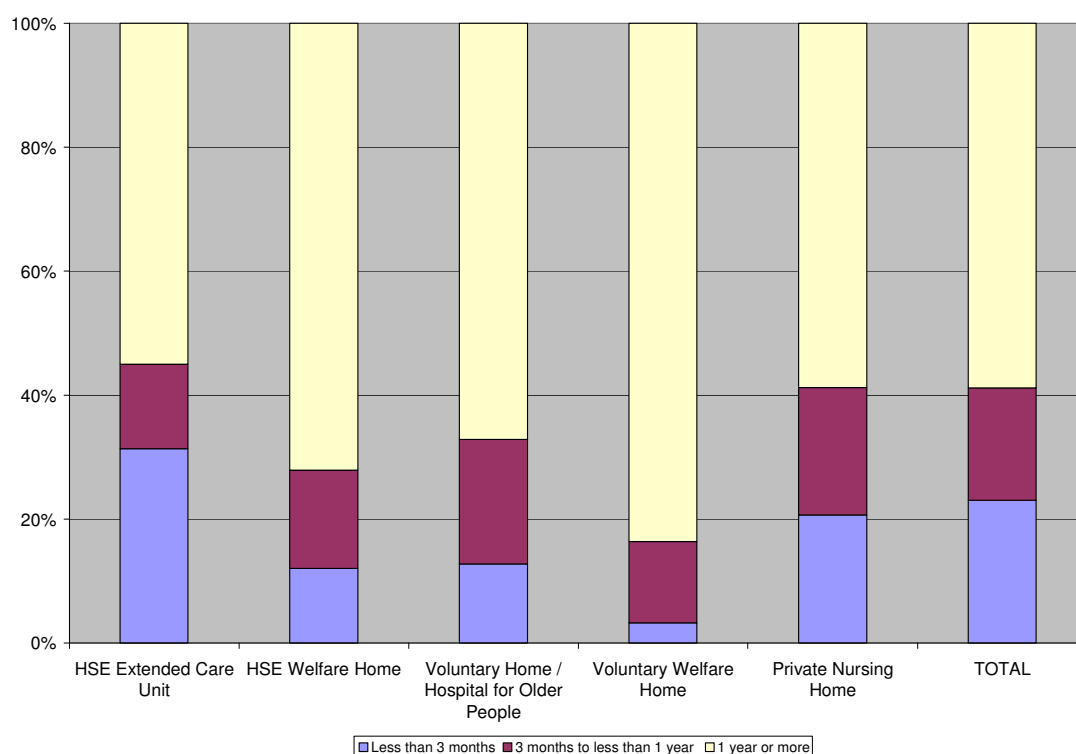
Almost all (97.0%) of patients in limited-stay beds had a length of stay of less than three months, ranging from 80.5% in HSE welfare homes to 100.0% in voluntary welfare homes. The length of stay of patients in long-stay beds is more varied. Slightly less than a quarter (23.0%) have a length of stay of less than three months ranging from 3.3% in voluntary homes / hospitals for older people to 31.4% in HSE extended care units.

Figure B6 re-categorises length of stay of patients in long-stay beds into three categories - less than three months, three months to less than one year and one year and over. 58.8% of patients in long-stay beds have a length of stay of a year or more, ranging from 55.0% in HSE extended care units to 83.6% of voluntary welfare homes. For patients in limited stay beds, where intended length of stay is less than three months, 0.4% in fact remained on for 1 year or more.

Section C

Survey Results by HSE Region

Section C re-examines the data collected in the 2011 survey presenting it by the HSE Region in which each unit was located on 31 December 2011.

The HSE South region reported the highest number of beds (6,732) accounting for almost a third (29.4%) of all beds reported in the survey. The region with the lowest reported number of beds was Dublin/ North-East at 4,327 or 18.9% of beds. The reported bed numbers should be considered in the light of the relative response rates for the different regions given in Table 1 of the Introduction to this report. As it happens, the response rate for Dublin / North-East was in fact higher than that of the South, at 94.4% and 85.6%, respectively.

The overall occupancy rate among long-stay units was 90.7%. This varied from 86.1% in units in the HSE West region to 94.2% in units in Dublin / North-East.

Table C1 below gives details by area of numbers of beds by type, residents, percentage of beds and patients in each area and percentage occupancy.

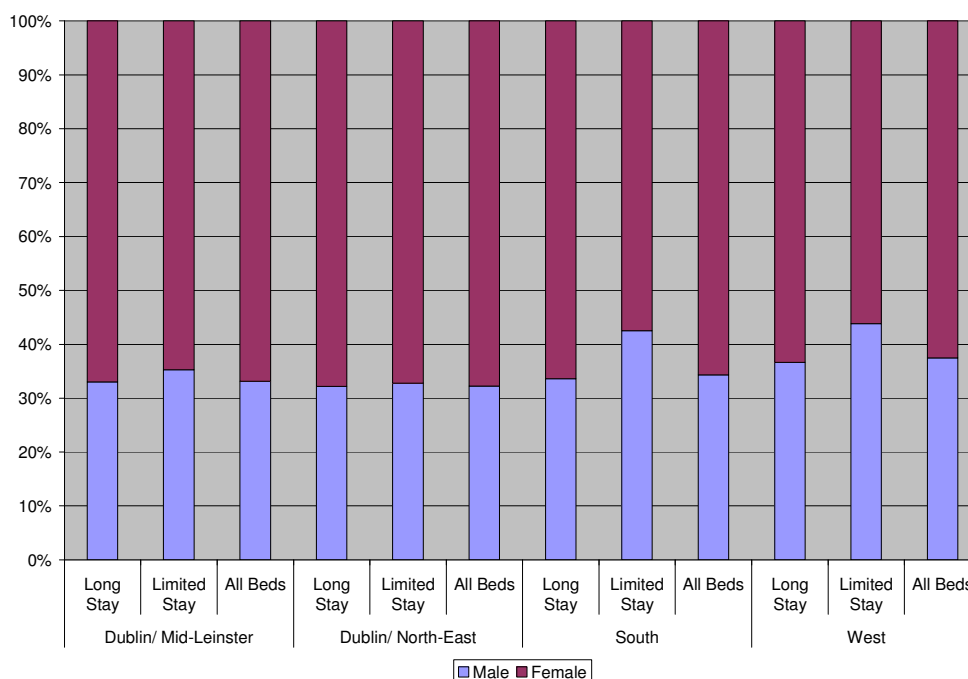
Gender and Age

Tables C2 to C5 and Figures C1 look at the gender and age distribution of patients within each region. Table C2 gives details of the gender profile of patients within each area which shows that nationally about 65.6% of patients are female and that there is not much variation within the four regions. There is a slightly higher proportion of female patients in long-stay beds (66.1%) than in limited-stay beds (59.9%).

Approximately half (46.9%) of patients are aged 80 to 89 years and there is a further 16.5% aged 90 to 94 years together with 6.0% aged 95 years and over, making a total of almost 70% aged 80 years and over. There is a slightly lower proportion of patients in limited-stay beds aged 80 years or over (61.5%) than in long-stay beds (70.1%), while the proportion of patients aged 80 years and over varies from 67.3% in Dublin / Mid-Leinster to 70.6% in the West.

Dependency

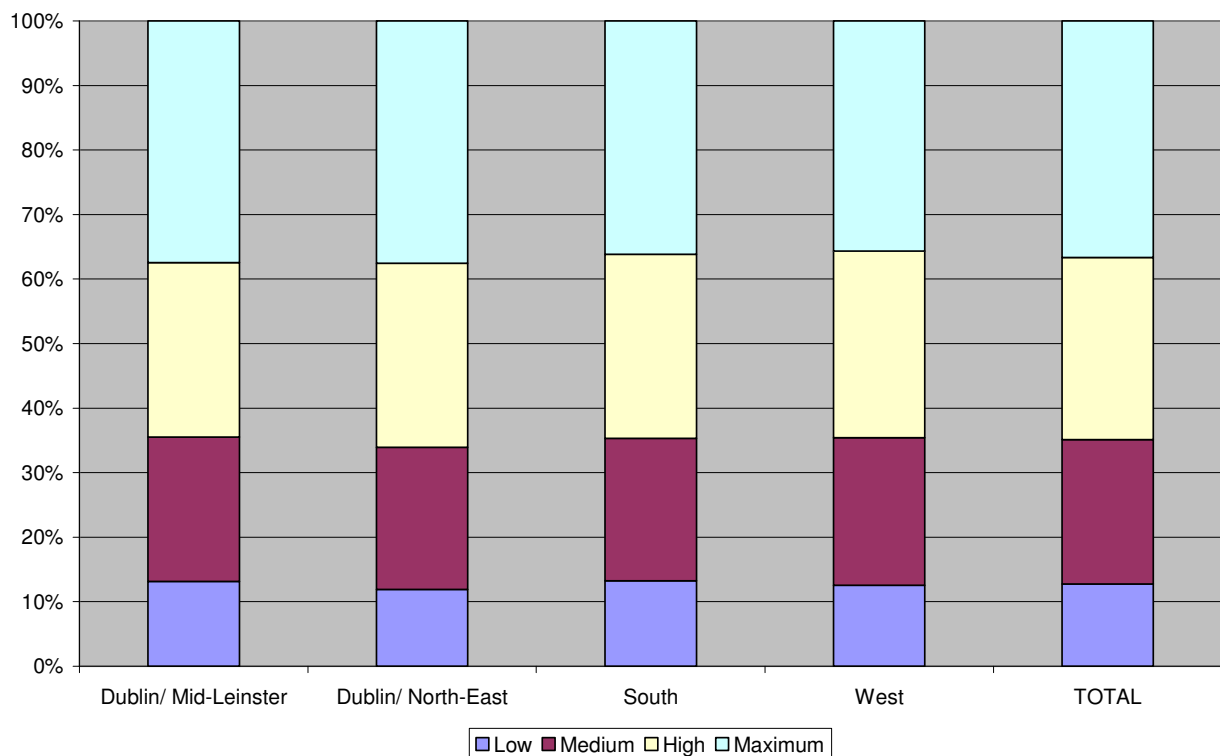
Table C6 and figure C2 below give details of dependency levels among patients within each region. Two thirds of patients (64.9%) are either in the high dependency or maximum dependency category (See the corresponding paragraph in section B for definitions). There is only a small variation between regions with Dublin / North East reporting the highest levels of dependency among their patients. Almost two-thirds (66.1%) of patients in this region were categorised as high or maximum dependency and a similar proportion (67.2%) of patients in long-stay beds were categorised as such in that area. The Dublin / Mid-Leinster region had the smallest proportion (64.5%) of patients placed in the highest two dependency categories.

In relation to limited-stay beds, which make up roughly 10% of all available beds, the pattern is somewhat different, with 46.0% of patients classified as high & maximum dependency. This ranges from 31.3% in the Dublin / Mid-Leinster region to 54.8% in the HSE West region. The proportion of patients in the medium dependency category in limited-stay beds was 37.4% as against 21.0% in long-stay beds. While there is only a small variance among the regions for long-stay beds, the proportion in limited-stay beds in the medium dependency category ranged from 32.0% in the West up to 52.6% in Dublin / Mid-Leinster.

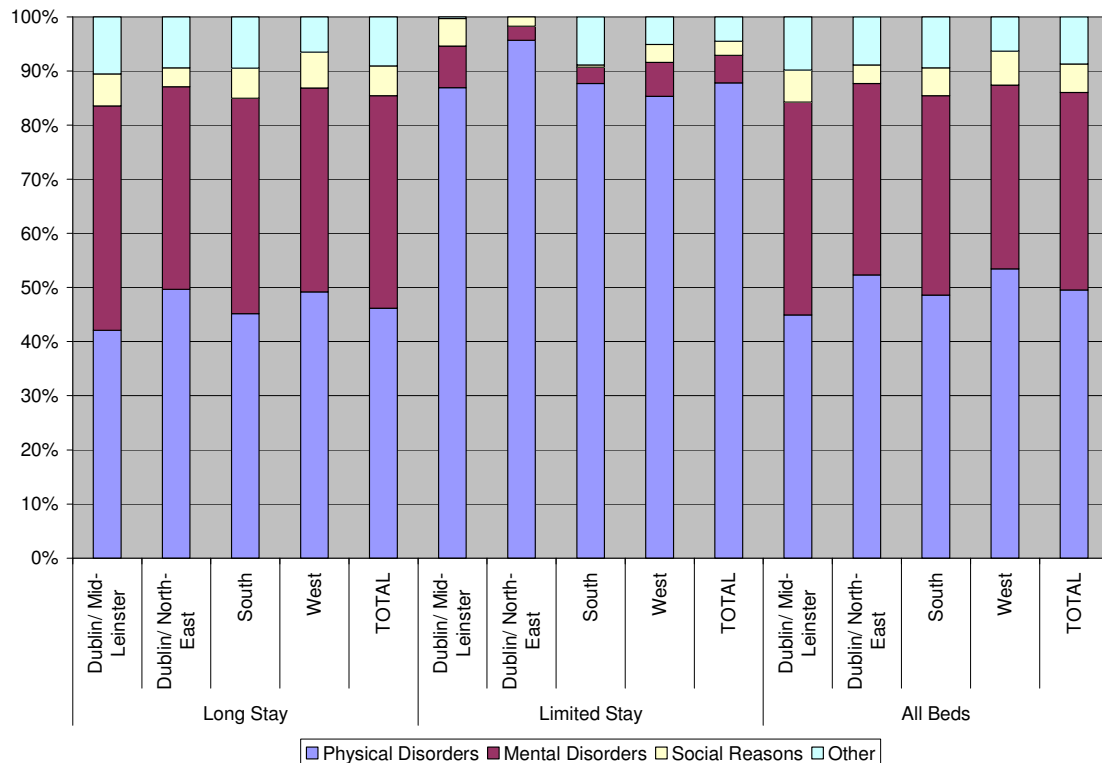

Figure C3 aggregates the categories into four groups as follows:

- Physical Disorders (Respite, Chronic Physical Illness, Convalescence, Rehabilitation, Physical Disability, Palliative Care)
- Mental Disorders (Chronic Mental Illness, Dementia, Intellectual Disability)
- Social
- Other

The majority of patients suffer from physical or mental disorders (49.5% and 36.5%, respectively) while social reasons account for only 5.3% of patients resident. Limited-stay beds are primarily occupied by patients suffering from physical disorders (87.8%), ranging from 85.3% in the Western region to 95.7% in Dublin / North-East.

Long-Stay Units by HSE Region: Percentage Distribution of Patients Resident at 31 December 2011 by Bed-Type and Medico/Social Status



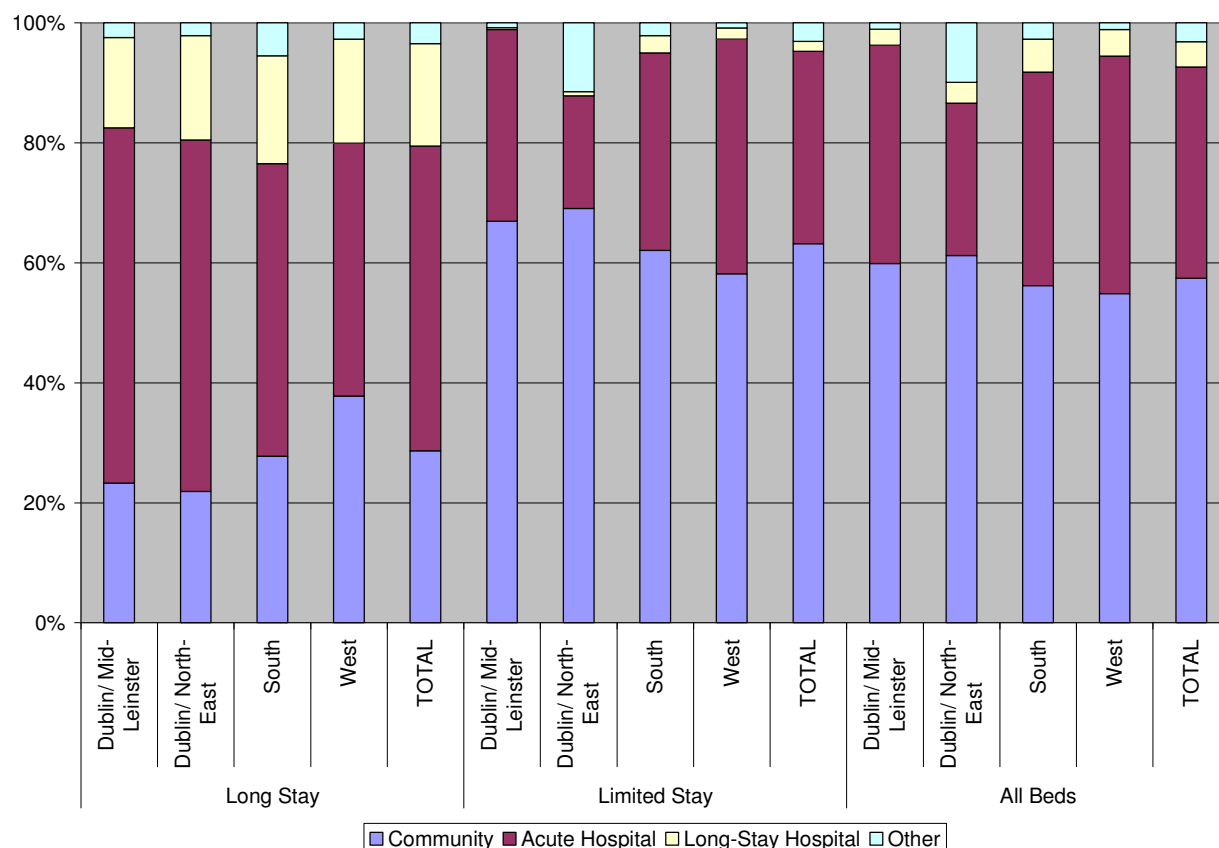
Admissions

Table C8 and Figure C4 give details of the source of admissions by region. As stated earlier, the majority of patients (57.5%) were admitted from the community. However there is considerable variation among the regions. For example, 54.9% of patients were admitted from the community within the western region compared to 61.2% of patients in the Dublin / North-East region. Similarly, the proportion admitted from acute hospitals varies from 25.4% within the Dublin / North-East region to 39.6% in the West.

During 2011 By Bed-Type and Source of Admission



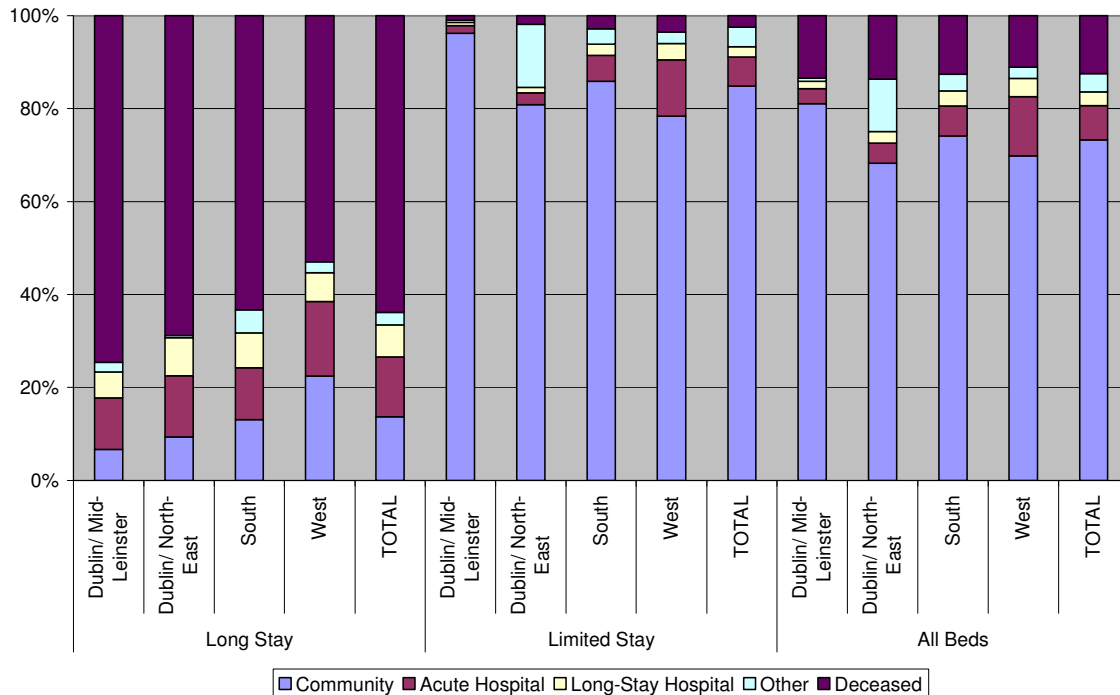
Discharges

Table C9 and Figure C5 give details of the destination of patients who were discharged throughout 2011 within each region. The majority of patients (73.2%) were discharged back into the community. However, there is some variation among the regions. For example, 68.2% of patients in Dublin / North-East were discharged back into the community while the figure within Dublin / Mid-Leinster is 81.1%. The proportion of patients who were deceased varies slightly from 11.0% in the West to 13.7% in Dublin / North-East.

Length of Stay

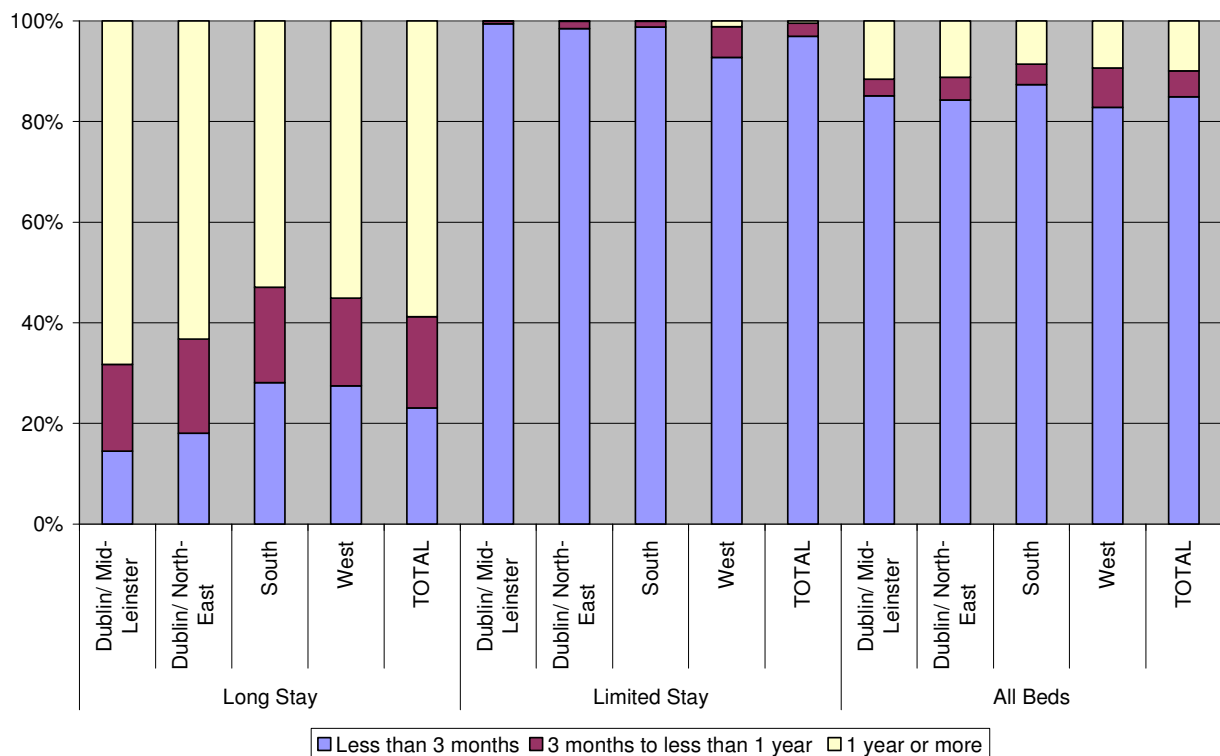
Over four-fifths (84.9%) of patients who were discharged in 2011 were in residence for less than three months. Table C10 and Figure C6 give details of the length of stay of discharged patients by bed-type within each region. As expected, the vast majority (97.0%) of patients in limited-stay beds have a length of stay of less than 3 months. Over half (58.8%) of patients in long-stay beds have a length of stay of one year or more.

Dublin / Mid-Leinster has the largest proportion (68.3%) of patients in long-stay beds with a length of one year or more, while the South has the highest proportion (28.1%) of patients in long-stay beds with a length of stay of less than three months.

NOTE 1 – LONG-STAY UNIT CATEGORY

The following definitions may be of assistance in distinguishing between the different categories supplied

HSE Extended Care Unit – A HSE extended care unit is a facility run by the Health Service Executive. These institutions generally provide accommodation for older people who are in need of care for medical reasons.

HSE Welfare Home – A HSE welfare home is a home run by the Health Service Executive. These institutions generally provide accommodation for older people who are in need of long or short-term care for medical or other reasons.

Voluntary Welfare Home – A voluntary welfare home is a home run by a charitable non-profit making organisation in which patients are not maintained for the personal profit of the proprietors. This includes all welfare homes run by religious orders as well as homes run by lay charitable organisations. These institutions generally provide accommodation for older people who are in need of long or short-term care for medical or other reasons.

Voluntary Home/Hospital for Older People – A voluntary nursing home is a home run by a charitable non-profit making organisation in which patients are not maintained for the personal profit of the proprietors. This includes all nursing homes run by religious orders as well as homes run by lay charitable organisations.

Private Nursing Home – A private nursing home is a home which is run as a private business for the care and maintenance of dependent persons. As the term implies, these are nursing homes established by private individuals or by companies in the private sector, which are run on a profit-making basis.

NOTE 2 – BED TYPE

Definitions for bed types, which have been grouped into long-stay beds and limited-stay beds, are given below.

Long-Stay Beds – Where intended length of stay of patient is equal to or greater than three months.

- **Extended/Continuing Care (including contract)** – These beds are allocated to people who have been assessed as being in need of long term care.
- **Psychiatry of Old Age** – These are beds available for specialised psychiatric service of later life.
- **Young Chronic Sick** – These beds are allocated to young people with an illness which has lasted a long period of time, is usually irreversible, and may be progressive.

Limited-Stay Beds – Where intended length of stay of patient is less than three months.

- **Rehabilitation** – These beds are allocated for the admission of persons for short periods of time in order to allow them to be rehabilitated after an illness/injury.
- **Convalescence** – These beds are allocated for the admission of persons for short periods of time in order to allow them to recuperate after an illness/injury.
- **Palliative Care** – These beds are allocated to patients at a time when the medical expectation is no longer cure.
- **Respite** – These beds are allocated for the planned admission of dependent persons for short periods of time in order to assist carers in their task of caring.

NOTE 3 – ACTIVITY INFORMATION

Tables A1, A2 and A3 seek information on the numbers of patients in residence in the unit at 31 December 2011. **Therefore the totals for patients in residence in Tables A1, A2 and A3 as indicated should be in agreement. Also, the total number of patients in residence cannot exceed the total number of beds available.**

NOTE 4 - LEVEL OF DEPENDENCY

The following definitions should be used to classify patients in residence at 31 December 2011 according to different levels of dependency:

Low Dependency: This category refers to people who need some support in the community and the more independent residents in residential accommodation who require little nursing care. They are usually independently mobile but may use a walking stick and have difficulty managing stairs.

Medium Dependency: Person whose independence is impaired to the extent that he or she requires residential care because the appropriate support and nursing care required by the person cannot be provided by the community. Mobility is impaired to the extent that the person requires supervision or a walking aid.

High Dependency: Independence is impaired to the extent that the person requires residential care but is not bed bound. The person may have a combination of physical and mental disabilities, may be confused at times and be incontinent. He/she may require a walking aid and physical assistance to walk.

Maximum Dependency: People whose independence is impaired to the extent that he/she requires nursing care. The person is likely to be bed bound, requires assistance with all aspects of physical care and may be ambulant but confused, disturbed and incontinent.

NOTE 5 – MEDICO/SOCIAL STATUS

1) Respite – Patients in need of respite care are dependent persons admitted for short periods of time in order to assist their carers in their task of caring.

2) Chronic Mental Illness – ‘Mental illness’ means a state of mind of a person which affects the person’s thinking, perceiving, emotion or judgement and which seriously impairs the mental function of the person to the extent that he or she requires care or medical treatment in his or her own interest or in the interest of other persons. For mental illness to be chronic it would have to be sustained continuously without remission over a period of time.

3) Chronic Physical Illness – There is no formal definition of chronic physical disease but such illness would normally be characterised by having lasted a long period of time, is usually irreversible, and may be progressive.

4) Convalescence – Patients in need of

convalescence are persons admitted for short periods of time in order to allow them to recuperate after an illness/injury.

5) Rehabilitation – Patients in need of rehabilitation are persons admitted for short periods of time in order to allow them to receive rehabilitation after an illness/injury.

6) Dementia – Severe dementia means a deterioration of the brain of a person which significantly impairs the intellectual function of the person thereby affecting thought, comprehension and memory and which includes severe psychiatric or behavioural symptoms such as physical aggression.

7) Physical Disability – Physical disability, in relation to a person, means a substantial restriction in the capacity of the person to carry on a profession, business or occupation in the State or to participate in social or cultural life in the State by reason of an enduring physical impairment.

8) Intellectual Disability – Significant intellectual disability means a state of arrested or incomplete development of mind of a person which includes significant impairment of intelligence and social functioning and abnormally aggressive or seriously irresponsible conduct on the part of the person.

9) Social Reasons – This category covers admissions for reasons other than medical ones.

10) Palliative Care – Palliative care beds are allocated to patients at a time when the medical expectation is no longer cure.

NOTE 6 –ADMISSION AND DISCHARGE ACTIVITY

Tables C1 and C2 seek information on the numbers of patients discharged from the unit during the year.

Therefore, the totals for patients discharged for both long-stay and limited-stay beds entered in Tables C1 and C2 should be in agreement.

For the purposes of this survey, short absences which occur when patients occasionally go home for weekends or short breaks should not be regarded as discharges or admissions.
